FRANKLIN REC'S APPROACH TO LARGE ELECTRIC LOADS

Over the past several years, communities across the country have seen growing interest from industries that require large amounts

of electricity, including data centers, advanced manufacturing facilities and other technology-driven operations. As discussions about these projects continue, members have asked how a large electric load would impact Franklin REC and the cooperative's existing members.

First and foremost, Franklin REC's responsibility is to provide safe, reliable and affordable electric service to all members. We also have an obligation to serve members within our service territory. Any large-load project must be evaluated through that lens.

Infrastructure, reliability considerations

One common misconception is that existing members would be responsible for paying the costs of infrastructure needed to serve a large industrial customer. That is not the case. Large-load projects are required to fund the infrastructure necessary to serve their load, including transmission facilities, substations, distribution infrastructure and any generation resources required to support the project. These costs are not shifted to Franklin REC's existing members.

Another question we often hear is whether new power plants would need to be built to serve a large load. In many cases, the answer is no. Franklin REC, Corn Belt Power Cooperative and our generation partners continually evaluate available capacity across the electric system. Any project would be thoroughly studied to ensure sufficient power is available before service commitments are made.

Members also ask whether serving a large customer could divert power from homes, farms or local businesses during periods of high demand.

The answer is no. Franklin REC would not shut off service to existing members or implement rolling outages in order to keep electricity flowing to a specific member. Reliability standards remain in place for all members, and the cooperative continues to plan and operate the system accordingly.

Cost-of-service evaluations

Another important protection involves rates. Franklin REC regularly conducts cost-of-service studies that evaluate the actual cost of serving each member class. These studies help ensure that residential, commercial, agricultural and industrial members each pay rates that reflect the cost of providing service to their respective groups. Large-load customers are evaluated separately, and any rate structure developed for a project would be designed specifically around the costs and requirements associated with serving that load.

In addition, large-load contracts often include long-term commitments, minimum billing requirements and other protections designed to ensure that the costs associated with serving the project remain with the project itself rather than shifting to existing members.

Our commitment to members

As with any major decision, Franklin REC's board of directors would carefully evaluate the long-term impact on the cooperative and its members before moving forward with a large-load project.

As discussions around large-load development continue, Franklin REC remains committed to evaluating every opportunity carefully and transparently. Our focus will always remain on protecting reliability, maintaining fairness among member classes, and ensuring that any new load provides value to the cooperative and our members, while paying its own way on the electric system.

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FRANKLIN REC HOSTS DISCUSSION WITH U.S. SEN. CHUCK GRASSLEY

Franklin REC recently hosted U.S. Sen. Chuck Grassley during a visit to the area. The discussion focused on issues impacting rural communities and the electric utility industry, and fellow local electric cooperatives also joined for the conversation.

Topics included electric reliability, the uncertainty surrounding future generation resources, and the challenges of ensuring dependable and affordable power for rural consumers.

Cooperative representatives emphasized the importance of maintaining an “all-of-the-above” energy strategy that utilizes a diverse mix of generation resources to support reliability, affordability and energy security. As energy demand continues to grow, a balanced approach to generation helps ensure that electric cooperatives can continue to provide dependable service to the communities they serve.

Federal funding programs

The conversation also highlighted U.S. Department of Agriculture funding programs that electric cooperatives utilize to support economic development in rural communities. Through loan and grant opportunities, cooperatives can help local businesses expand, create jobs and invest in projects that strengthen the local



economy. These programs provide valuable resources that help rural communities remain vibrant and positioned for future growth.

Additionally, participants discussed the Federal Emergency Management Agency disaster assistance programs and the importance of disaster preparedness and recovery resources for rural areas. Access to these programs can help communities and utilities respond more effectively

following severe weather events and other emergencies.

Advocating for our members

Franklin REC values opportunities to engage with elected officials and industry partners to share the perspectives of the cooperative and its members. Discussions such as these help ensure that the unique needs and challenges facing rural electric cooperatives and rural communities remain part of ongoing conversations at the state and federal levels.

SHARING SUCCESS WITH OUR COMMUNITY

Franklin REC is proud to support the West Fork Agriculture and FFA Department with a financial contribution toward its new greenhouse project.

The greenhouse will be constructed next to the existing agriculture building on the West Fork School campus, providing students with valuable hands-on learning opportunities. The facility will

allow students to grow a variety of horticultural crops, experiment with different growing environments and gain practical experience in a real-world agricultural setting.

Through a partnership between Franklin REC, Corn Belt Power Cooperative, CoBank and Basin Electric Power Cooperative, funding was provided to help make this



project a reality. This investment reflects the cooperatives' shared commitment to supporting education and creating opportunities for students to develop skills that will benefit them in the future.

FRUIT SALAD FOR A CROWD

- 1 ripe pineapple
- 1 ripe cantaloupe
- 4 ripe mangoes
- 2 pounds fresh strawberries
- 4 cups seedless green grapes
- 1½ cups fresh blueberries
- 3-5 cups powdered sugar

Cut pineapple and cantaloupe into bite-size pieces. Peel mango with potato peeler and cut into pieces. Cut strawberries into pieces. Add all fruit to a large bowl and add powdered sugar. Stir to form juice. Adjust sugar to taste. Serves 20

DILL PICKLE PASTA SALAD

- 1 16-ounce box rotini pasta
- 1 cup mayonnaise
- ½ cup sour cream
- ⅓ cup dill pickle juice
- 2 tablespoons dried dill
- ¼ teaspoon salt
- ¼ teaspoon pepper
- 2 cups baby dill pickles, chopped
- 1 8-ounce block Colby Jack cheese, cubed
- 1 small white onion, finely chopped

Cook pasta according to package directions, drain water. In a large bowl, combine mayonnaise, sour cream, dill pickle juice (from the pickle jar), dried dill, salt and pepper. Pour dressing over pasta and stir. Add pickles, cheese and onions. Serve immediately or chill for 1-2 hours in the refrigerator. Serves 12

RHUBARB LEMONADE

- 4 cups fresh rhubarb, chopped
- 4 cups water, divided
- ¾-1 cup granulated sugar
- ¾ cup fresh lemon juice, 4-5 lemons
- ice cubes, for serving

In a saucepan, combine rhubarb, 2 cups water and sugar. Bring to a gentle boil, then reduce heat and simmer for 15-20 minutes until rhubarb softens and releases its color. Strain the mixture through a fine-mesh sieve, pressing gently to extract the liquid. Discard solids and allow the syrup to cool. In a large pitcher, combine the cooled rhubarb syrup, fresh lemon juice and 2 cups cold water. Stir well and taste. Adjust sweetness or dilution by adding more sugar or water as needed. Refrigerate for at least 1 hour before serving with ice. Serves 6

SUPER SALAD

- 1 pound macaroni
- 1 large green pepper, chopped
- 4 carrots, shredded
- 1 onion, chopped
- 1 can sweetened condensed milk
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup vinegar
- 2 cups mayonnaise
- 1 teaspoon salt
- ¼ teaspoon pepper

Cook macaroni, then drain and cool. Add remaining ingredients and stir. Serves 15-20

CRISP TUNA-CABBAGE SALAD

- 1 5-ounce can tuna, drained
- 2 cups green or red cabbage, finely chopped
- 1 tablespoon mayonnaise
- 1 tablespoon Miracle Whip salad dressing
- 3 tablespoons plain Greek yogurt
- salt, to taste
- pepper, to taste
- onion, finely chopped, to taste, optional
- garden-fresh tomato slices, optional

Mix tuna and cabbage thoroughly. Mix mayonnaise, Miracle Whip and yogurt thoroughly. Combine the two mixtures. Add salt and pepper. Add onion, if desired. Can be served on slices of tomatoes. *Serves 2*

COLESLAW — FRESH OR FROZEN

- 6 cups cabbage, shredded
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 3 ribs celery, chopped
- 1 small green bell pepper, chopped
- 1 cup white vinegar
- ½ cup water
- 1½ cups sugar
- 1 teaspoon celery seed
- 1 teaspoon mustard seed

Sprinkle salt over cabbage and let sit at room temperature for 1 hour, then drain. Add celery and bell pepper to cabbage. Refrigerate while mixing the dressing. In a saucepan, put vinegar, water, sugar and seeds. Bring to boil and then boil for only 1 minute. Remove from heat and let cool for 30 minutes before pouring over cabbage mix. Divide into 12 serving containers to serve fresh, or in freezer bags to freeze. Keeps 2 weeks in refrigerator. If frozen, remove coleslaw for 2 hours before serving. *Serves 12*

GREEK SUMMER SALAD

- 4-5 potatoes
- 6 medium tomatoes
- 2 cucumbers
- 1 large onion
- 1 green pepper, optional

Place in refrigerator to soak for 1-2 days, occasionally turning the bag upside down. Celery, turnips and radish would also be delicious. *Serves 4*

UNDERSTANDING YOUR ELECTRIC BILL

August is typically one of the warmest months of the year, and that means air conditioners across our territory are working overtime to keep homes comfortable. During periods of extreme heat, many members may see an increase in their electric bill and wonder what factors contribute to the cost of electricity.

At Franklin REC, we believe understanding your electric bill is an important part of being an informed member. While the total amount due may seem like a single number, it actually reflects several different costs associated with delivering reliable electricity to your home or business.



Energy use impacts your bill

The largest factor is often the amount of energy you use. This is the **Energy Charge** on your bill. Electricity is measured in kilowatt-hours (kWh), and the more energy your household consumes, the higher your bill will be. During the summer, air conditioning is typically the largest driver of increased energy use. When temperatures climb into the 90s or higher, our cooling systems run longer and more frequently, consuming significantly more electricity than they do during milder weather.



Operational and infrastructure costs

Transmission costs also play a role. This is the **Facility Charge** on your bill. Before electricity reaches your home, it must travel across a network of high-voltage transmission

lines that connect power plants to local distribution systems. Transmission equipment requires ongoing maintenance and upgrades to ensure reliability, especially as electricity demand continues to grow.

Closer to home, Franklin REC maintains the local electric distribution system – utility poles, power lines, transformers, substations and other essential equipment that safely delivers power to members.

Maintaining this equipment is covered through the monthly facility charge. This is a flat monthly fee all members pay based on their electric service size, regardless of how much electricity they use. This fixed fee ensures all members pay a fair share of the basic operational costs required to keep the power grid reliable and ready to serve your home or business. Whether a member uses a little electricity or a lot, we must maintain infrastructure and have crews, equipment and resources available to provide electricity around the clock.



Wholesale power costs

Summer temperatures can also influence costs in less obvious ways. When the demand for electricity is high across a region, wholesale power prices can increase. This is the **Energy Cost Adjustment** on your bill. Utilities and grid operators must ensure enough generation is available to meet peak demand, and those costs can be reflected throughout the electric system.



Ways to lower your energy use

The good news is that simple steps to lower energy use can make a meaningful difference. Setting your thermostat a few degrees higher when you're away, replacing dirty HVAC filters, using ceiling fans, sealing air leaks and avoiding the use of major appliances during the hottest parts of the day can help reduce energy consumption and lower your bill.

Franklin REC's mission is to provide safe, reliable and affordable electricity while being transparent about the factors that impact energy costs. We understand every dollar matters, and we are committed to making smart investments that keep the lights on and support the communities we serve.

CAREER CENTER TO OPEN THIS FALL

Beginning this fall, the Franklin County North Iowa Area Community College (NIACC) Career Center will open its doors as a hub for innovative concurrent enrollment opportunities, allowing high school students to earn both college and high school credit simultaneously.

The Career Center will serve juniors and seniors from Belmond-Klemme, Hampton-Dumont-CAL and West Fork High Schools, providing hands-on career and technical education pathways that help students gain valuable credentials while potentially saving an estimated \$10,000 in future college tuition costs. By earning college credits and industry-recognized certifications before graduation, students can accelerate their educational and career goals while reducing future student debt.

Educational pathways

Students will have access to three career pathways: welding, construction and health sciences. Those enrolled in the welding and construction programs will earn a NIACC welding or building trades diploma.



The Franklin County NIACC Career Center is located at 1276 Olive Ave. in Hampton.

Students participating in the health sciences academy will earn their Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA) credential, providing a strong foundation for careers in healthcare. The CNA pathway also fulfills foundational coursework and many prerequisites for advanced programs such as nursing, physical therapy assistant, medical assistant, licensed practical nursing and other healthcare professions.

In addition to serving high school students, the Career Center will offer continuing education opportunities for community members, including English as a Second Language (ESL) courses, High School Equivalency Diploma (HSED) classes, and a variety of community enrichment and hobby courses.

Local public-private collaboration

The Franklin County NIACC Career Center is the result of a strong partnership among NIACC, local school districts, and regional business and industry leaders. These collaborations are essential for developing a skilled workforce and creating sustainable talent pipelines that align with local economic needs.

Through expanded Career and Technical Education opportunities, the Career Center will play a key role in strengthening the regional workforce, supporting economic growth, and preparing students and community members for future success.

IOWA LINEWORKERS TO BRING POWER AND OPPORTUNITY TO GUATEMALA

This September, seven Iowa electric cooperative lineworkers will join fellow cooperative lineworkers from Colorado and Oklahoma on a mission that extends far beyond building power lines.

Together, the 18-member volunteer team will travel to rural Guatemala through NRECA International's electrification program, bringing electricity to two remote villages for the first time.

Their work will provide reliable electric service to approximately 100 homes, a school and a newly constructed health center, creating

opportunities for education, health care and economic development that many families have never experienced.

For these lineworkers, the trip is an opportunity to use their professional skills to make a lasting difference for families living in communities without access to electricity.

Electricity changes daily life in countless ways, from providing lighting for students to study after dark to allowing health care providers to refrigerate medicines and safely care for patients. Access to reliable electricity also creates

new opportunities for businesses and improves overall quality of life.

More than bringing power

The project's impact won't stop when the lights come on.

While in Guatemala, the team will also complete a community service project by helping equip an elementary school kitchen so it can prepare meals for local children and supplying a new community health center with much-needed equipment and resources. These improvements will continue serving families long after the lineworkers return home.

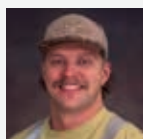

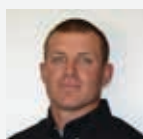

A BRUSH WITH HOPE

The picture on Facebook caught my eye right away. There was my friend Lou Blanchfield, grinning by a colorful painting with a 2025 Iowa State Fair blue ribbon.

My first thought was, “Wow, what a cool cow picture. Good for Lou!”

I figured there was a story here. It all came out when I caught up with Lou last December. “The opportunity to paint was God’s gift to me,” Lou told me, as we enjoyed a cup of hot tea in her living room. “It gave me my life back.”

I was stunned as Lou shared her incredible saga. It turns out this dear, sweet lady I knew as a dedicated community volunteer is a tough survivor with a warrior spirit. Her award-winning watercolor embodies the gift of life itself.

Beyond the blue ribbon

Lou’s ordeal began in 2019, when she began experiencing unusual symptoms, including balance issues. “I’d be in the wooded area by our farm with our grandkids, and I’d fall,” said Lou, who was 70 at the time.

Lou also recalled the time she was sweeping the deck stairs, felt faint and fell into the garden mulch. Then there were the challenges with remembering names and dates. “I thought all this might just be part of getting older,” she told me.

Things only got worse. Climbing stairs became almost impossible. It was hard for Lou to interact with people. Medical checkups didn’t provide many answers. One doctor told her it was probably COVID-19. A doctor at the Mayo Clinic finally diagnosed her problem – idiopathic normal-pressure hydrocephalus (iNPH).

This treatable neurological disorder is caused by a buildup of cerebrospinal fluid in the brain. It affects older adults and is characterized by a trio of symptoms, including balance issues/

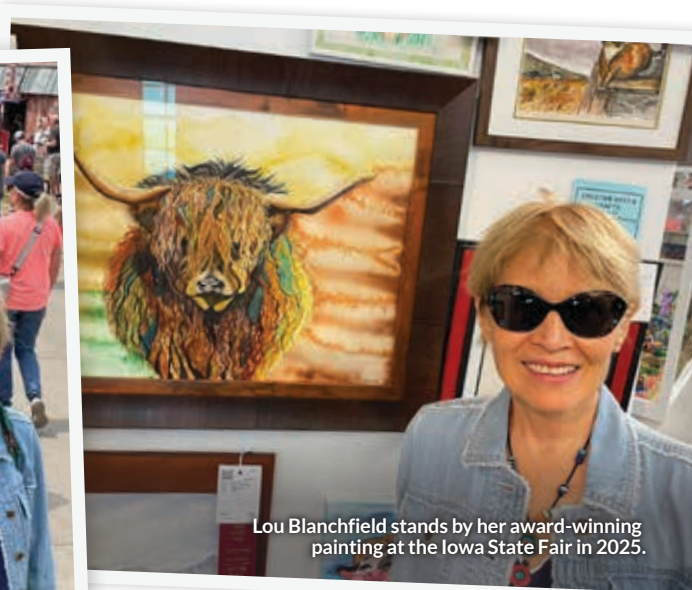
frequent falls, cognitive decline/ memory loss and urinary urgency. “I had all the symptoms – ‘wet, wacky and wobbly,’” Lou said.

While this diagnosis helped clarify some things, Lou’s health challenges weren’t over. In October 2022, Lou fell again. She’d been preparing some freezer meals during harvest and tripped on the dishwasher door. “I face planted,” said Lou, who suffered a subdural hematoma, a potentially life-threatening condition where blood collects between the layers of tissue that surround the brain, causing dangerous pressure. “I couldn’t walk. I couldn’t talk. I had difficulty thinking and lost my creativity.”

Lou told me of her fears after she met with a neurosurgeon at the University of Nebraska-Omaha. “He told me, ‘You’ll get a lot back, but there are no guarantees.’”

Perseverance, painting and a new chance at life

Still, Lou forged ahead. Her speech therapist at Stewart

Memorial Community Hospital in Lake City gave her an assignment – paint “Starry Night,” the iconic artwork by Vincent van Gogh.

“How in the world can I do that?” Lou wondered. “But then I studied that painting, and all the brush strokes were shaped like the letter C. I knew I could do that.”

Lou also hired Susan Smith, an artist from Jefferson, to give her weekly painting lessons. All this led to the creation of “Clyde,” a free-flowing, vibrant depiction of a Highland bull. Lou thought it would be fun to enter her watercolor in an open class at the Iowa State Fair. “I was 77 years old when I became a first-time fair exhibitor.”

A blue-ribbon-winning exhibitor, I might add. Lou’s remarkable journey reminds me of the intriguing words of Friedrich Nietzsche, the German philosopher who noted, “The essence of all beautiful art, all great art, is gratitude.”

Perhaps no one understands this better than Lou. “God healed me. I’ve got blessings all over the place.”
